Filed a Petition on Ram Nagar Leprosy Colony Issue at Patna court

Mr. Kamlesh –APAL member approached to Mr. Gautam Kejriwal, a lawyer of the High Court and discussed apathy of the Government of Bihar. Mr. Ramesh Prasad is the Deputy Secretary of the upliftment, we made him a litigant and a case was filed in the court, after heard the PIL the judge has ordered the Principal Secretary of the Government of Bihar that all Provide proper amount of food and medicine to the People affected by leprosy and their families in a timely manner.

The High Court gave very helpful decision in favor to people affected by leprosy who are residi9ng in the state of Bihar for giving strong decision to take care of them; otherwise strong action must be logged to responsible authorities.

The Online meeting conducted in the date of 12^{th} June 2020 from the APAL head office in Hyderabad

Introduction: The COVID-19 pandemic has deeply impacted the lives of persons affected by the disease. In response to this upheaval, the Association of People Affected by Leprosy (APAL) conducted a trial version board members' online meeting on 12th June 2020, 11 am to 12 am to address key challenges during the India health crisis and spearhead the leprosy community's emergency response. This online meeting was very useful to us to better understand the challenges of people affected by leprosy from all states of India.





The president of APAL, Mr. Narsappa asked a question to board members at that particular time that, what is the current COVID-19 situation of people affected by the disease of leprosy in all our states of India?

The board members of APAL have raised so many issues consistently, across India, as major concerns for persons affected during the COVID-19 pandemic: In most states, our APAL leaders represented and supported food aid and other key social protection services are reaching some persons affected, but many are unable to benefit from it because of structural barriers, transportation challenges, or information gaps. Persons affected are relying on the safety net of services from the Governments and NGOs, but it is unclear who is receiving what, and difficult to ensure that everyone's needs are being met.

Fundamental goods: Persons affected are facing difficulty obtaining basic goods, especially food, clean water, and soap, masks which are critical to fighting COVID-19 infection. Lost

livelihoods and travel restrictions have made it difficult to obtain food for many persons affected, and many communities of persons affected have not had access to clean water. The Government and local NGOs are supported by some food grains, soaps, and masks to the people affected by leprosy those who are residing in the leprosy colonies.

Health care: Persons affected have specific and ongoing leprosy-related healthcare needs. If persons affected can reach health facilities, they face reductions in services, as facilities transition to exclusively treating COVID-19 patients. MDT is largely still available, but reaction treatment is unobtainable for many persons affected. Unfortunately, in states of Maharashtra and Andhra Pradesh, 5 affected people are infected by Coronavirus and 1 person was dead.

Livelihoods: Persons affected often work in the informal economy. They are surviving only depending on begging, working as daily laborers, or running small shops but they lost all their livelihoods. As a result, many persons affected are unable to work and their ability to meet basic needs is in severe jeopardy.

Information about COVID-19: Health promotion information is reaching some person organization and some local NGOs are working to find alternative ways to get messages to those that need them. Most people haven't smart phones and newspapers also banned.

Intersecting vulnerabilities: Persons affected are not only vulnerable because of their status as a person that is affected by leprosy, but are often vulnerable for other reasons as well. These other factors, like age or gender, compound the challenges faced by persons affected during this time and deserve special attention.





It also contains some suggestions for the expansion of the scope of the EDPAL Bill.

Stated objects of the two Bills:

EDPAL Bill:

- To enact a comprehensive protection regime for persons affected by Leprosy and members of their families;
- To eliminate any discrimination or denial of equal treatment;
- To repeal and amend existing laws that negatively affect persons affected by Leprosy and promote segregation and discrimination; and
- To enable the State to discharge its positive obligations through affirmative action.

> 2017 Bill:

- To protect the human rights of persons affected by leprosy;
- To eliminate discrimination against them and their families;
- To promote their social welfare;
- To take steps for the prevention and control of leprosy;

Update on the Activities thus far, by Ms. Meghna Sharma, Program Officer- Advocacy, NCPEDP.

Ms. Meghna Sharma gave a short update on NCPEDP's previous project activities and achievements so far.

She discussed the nine capacity building training organized in 9 states in partnership with APAL and NCPEDP's state partners. More than 600 people were reached out through this training. Sharing her observations from the Maharashtra training she felt that people affected by leprosy were more aware of their rights. And they were enthusiastic about approaching the judiciary for their property rights. She also discussed the letter sent by Dr. Harsh Vardhan (Hon'ble Minister, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare) to various states in August 2019 to

repeal all discriminatory laws against persons affected by leprosy. NCPEDP wrote to the BJP ruled states, including the Chief Ministers, Health Ministers, Ministers of Social Justice and Empowerment, Chief Justices of the States, and even to Universities clearly defining the discriminatory laws that were being practiced in those states. Positive responses were received from some of the states/departments

NCPEDP also filed RTIs in 19 States and Union Territories seeking information on food and consumer supplies, awareness on leprosy issues, MCR footwear or healthcare, etc. On the issue of food supplies, there was no specific data for people affected by leprosy. But there were positive responses on awareness-raising efforts. Some states have done well-using tools like nukkadnatak (Street Play) and television advertisements. The Healthcare department had a good record of the number of MCR footwear distribution but the quality of this footwear is compromised.

Update on EDPAL Bill by Nikita Sarah, Head Advocacy and Communication, TLMTI

She started by appreciating the positive steps taken by the Health Minister Dr. HarshVardhan who paid attention to repealing discriminatory laws against people affected by Leprosy. TLMTI also sent letters to different states. Through a concerted effort the year 2019 saw a decline in these 119 discriminatory laws which have now been reduced to 102. She also drew attention to the unavailability of information on repealing of some laws in states as there has not been any notification.

Mentioning the EDPAL bill, she said that the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare had them asked to rework and add more flesh to the Bill and the reason being they wanted to push it to different ministries. With stakeholders consultations, the new Bill has been drafted and shared with the Ministry. And now the wait is to see how Ministry is going to respond to it.

Giving a background on the old bill she said that it had been in the pipeline since 2015 and had been sent to different ministries. Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment had responded that since persons affected by Leprosy have already been covered in RPWD Act and therefore they had no interest in another Bill. She further added that recommendations of the CRPD Committee speak of zero discriminatory laws. There is a lot of pressure on the Government to repeal these laws. The Ministry of Health and Family Welfare seems to be in support of this newly drafted Bill and a positive response is expected.

1. Update on PIL by Dr. DhvaniMehta, Senior Resident Fellow, Vidhi Centre for Legal Policy

Updating the Core Group on the PIL filed by Vidhi Centre for Legal Policy, Dr. Dhvani Mehta said that there has been no progress in the past one year and even now the court is just hearing urgent cases due to the pandemic restrictions. Also because hearings are now virtual there is no clarity on how the litigations would proceed.

She said she would consult with Advocate RajuRamchandran who has been representing the leprosy issue and ask him what the best approach is. Also, advocacy has to be continued. Giving her opinion she said that demands in the petition are not necessarily things that the court gets interested in. She suggested that currently, the sector should pursue the Government to get its attention to the demand rather than keeping all hopes with the court.

Responding to Dr. Mehta's suggestion Mr. Arman Ali opined that the sector needs to keep an eye on how courts work if they start functioning in a digital mode.

Ms. Nikita Sarah also raised a query and asked Dr. Mehta if it was a good idea to continue advocacy to demand the implementation of directives given by the Supreme Court in *Pankaj Sinha v. Union of India* and *Vidhi's petition.* Dr. Mehta suggested two options: Engaging with

authorities responsible for implementing these directions and also going to the court and ask for better enforcement.

Ms. MriduGoel suggested approaching the State Disability Commissioners with demands to implement the judgment.

2. Introduction by Dr. Vivek Lal, Executive Director, SILF

Dr. Vivek Lal is the present Executive Director of Sasakawa India Leprosy Foundation. He is a medical doctor and has been working on Leprosy issues for the past 10 years. In his current profile, he is looking at building synergies between the medical and the socio-economic aspect of people affected by leprosy. This was his first interaction with the group as he has recently joined this new role. He offered his support and involvement in future meetings and engagements.

Update on the new NCPEDP- DPI project- seeking feedback and suggestions by Ms. Asifa Parveen, Sr Program Officer, NCPEDP

Ms. Asifa Parveen started the session introducing the new DPI-TNF project which has the following two activities proposed.

Capacity Building and Leadership training for Youth affected by Leprosy and Youth with Disabilities.

a. Advocacy for Policy Change on Leprosy Issue.

The idea behind the project was to create a second line of leadership in the leprosy sector as this has been found missing. Young leadership is crucial for the sector. Thus a group of 100 youth (50 youth with Leprosy/ Family member of people affected by leprosy and 50 youth with disabilities) will be identified by the APAL and State partners and trained. These participants will be from those 9 states (Delhi, Haryana, Uttar Pradesh, Maharashtra, West Bengal, Telangana, Odisha, Jharkhand, and Andhra Pradesh) where training was conducted in the previous project and 'Chhattisgarh' would additionally be included This was originally planned as a two days training program to be conducted during May-July but due to the pandemic situation this had to be postponed and now the training would be provided through series of Webinars on capacity building of these youth.

These youth will be called 'Champions' and will be actively involved in advocacy activities.

The second activity 'Advocacy for Policy Change' would emphasize the need for strong and continued advocacy on different pressing issues like Land Rights, Employment Opportunities, Housing, and the existing discriminatory laws. The focus will be on the 10 identified states and the Central Government.

The champions will be supported to take advocacy initiatives. There will be two review meetings with these champions to take stock of advocacy and monitor progress and also to plan future projects.

Ms. Asifa also sought feedback and suggestions from the core group on engaging these youth in advocacy and ways of making these projects more impactful.

Mr. Thakar suggested that a written communication about the project be circulated and members could respond with their suggestions by email.

Ms. Nikita appreciated the idea of the second line of leadership. She shared that a lot of organizations are working with youth. These organizations can be approached if possible to

identify young people for this project. She informed that there is a Global Champions group from where young people can be identified and involved with the new project of DPI. This was a very active group and Ms. Nikita could support us to contact them.

Mr. Vagavathali Narsappa raised his concerns on behalf of people affected by leprosy. He said that just giving the training is not enough for them. There must be some interaction and monitoring with them after training programs. It was also important to ensure their financial independence. Regular support is needed for them. He suggested that the group members should come together and do something for the long term livelihood options for these youth.

Identifying key advocacy issues - the amendment of Assessment guidelines, lobbying for EDPAL Bill, Sensitization on RPWD Act and any other issues: Key responsibilities by Ms. Rati Misra, Adviser, NCPEDP

Ms. Misra started this session by focusing on key issues to be addressed in the next 6 months and how this group should act upon these issues. A quick discussion happened around that, starting with key advocacy issues. Key ones identified in the previous meeting were a revision of assessment guidelines, creating awareness about the RPWD Act, and lobbying for the enactment of the EDPAL Bill.

Mr. Uday Thakar felt that the land rights of persons affected by leprosy is the major concern in many states, like Gujarat and Bihar. Taking advantage of the pandemic the colony inhabitants are being removed from the colonies they have been living in. People approached the Court in Bihar leading to a stay order being issued but that was not a permanent solution. There is an issue of encroachment as well.

Ms. Kanchan Pamnani felt that we should take up this issue as with the forthcoming elections in Bihar, this is the time to move politically. She emphasized that the group and the sector need to focus only on one state, Bihar because if it gets done in one state, it will be easier to work in other states. She also felt that capacity building could be done anytime.

Ms. Tulika Das also suggested engaging with land rights activists who could support our advocacy.

Ms. Nikita joined in to raise concerns on the Assessment criteria. She said this is an urgent need. She said that the assessment criteria in use are completely incorrect. TLMTI and WHO worked together on the whole Assessment Criteria and this needs to be taken up by the Ministry. The current assessment guidelines do not cater to non-visible symptoms such as lack of sensation in the limbs etc and people are not given disability certificated and therefore are deprived of the many benefits due to them. There is a need to push for the correct assessment guidelines.

Ms. Rama Chari also felt that disability certification is such a crucial issue and comparatively more doable, is the group clear what should be the assessment criteria so that it can be taken up to the ministry. In her opinion, the sector can start sustained advocacy on it and get it solved. Other issues were long-drawn. Dr. Lal felt that given that evictions were currently happening in Bihar, it was imperative to take that issue up urgently.

Way Forward:

- 1. Capacity building of the second line of leadership, land issue (focus on Bihar), and Assessment Criteria for disability certificate needs to start parallel.
- 2. Ms. Tulika Das will try to connect with the land rights activist to know the technicalities of such issues.
- 3. Starting a media campaign around evictions happening and land rights.
- 4. APAL will research the number of colonies in Bihar and what are the issues they are facing. This research to be completed in 15 days from 29th July 2020.

- 5. Dr. Dhvani Mehta to handle the legal side.
- 6. TLMTI, (Ms. Nikita Sarah) will take up the Assessment Guidelines issue and others can join as and when required. She will share the guidelines were prepared with the group and which has already been shared with the concerned ministry.
- 7. Need to organize such meetings more often.
- 8. Next meeting scheduled for 12th August 2020.

APAL associated with SILF and SAMUTHAN supported financially by given 5000 rupees to each family and distributed house protection plastic cover in Bihar.

Luckily no human loss in the colony but their normal life is disrupted. The communication links and infrastructure such as power connections roads are damaged and disrupted and earning activities come to a standstill.





In response to this upheaval, the Association of People Affected by Leprosy (APAL) associated with SILF and SAMUTHAN supported financially by given 5000 rupees to 247 families of people affected by leprosy from 7 leprosy colonies in Bihar and also distributed house protection plastic cover to 90 families of people affected by leprosy in Bihar. The financial support and house protection plastic cover sponsored by Sasakawa India Leprosy Foundation.

APAL conducted sample version rapid Assessment of Socio-economic Impact of Covid-19

On the date of 2nd, August APAL conducted a sample version rapid assessment by phone call for analysis during time and system of questioning. APAL assessed to 43 people affected by leprosy from 6 leprosy colonies from Andhra Pradesh and Telangana.

Title: Rapid Assessment of Socio-economic Impact of Covid-19 on Vulnerable Populations in Leprosy Colonies

Collaborative Team- SILF, Association of Persons Affected by Leprosy (APAL), SHF/TNF, Institute of Economic Growth (IEG)......

Rationale

1. In terms of health and economic impact, the COVID-19 pandemic is particularly detrimental to those populations in the most vulnerable situations, including people living in poverty, older persons, persons with disabilities, and youth. If not properly addressed the social crisis created thus, may further increase inequality, exclusion, discrimination, and unemployment.

- 2. People residing in leprosy colonies are highly vulnerable considering the relatively older population, especially those with chronic health conditions like hypertension, diabetes, and cardiovascular disease; persons with disabilities who face challenges in accessing health-care services, due to lack of availability, accessibility, affordability, as well as stigma and discrimination prevalent in these self-settled colonies.
- 3. In sync with the COVID-19 Global Humanitarian Response Plan unveiled by the UN on 23 March 2020, underlining the importance of 'coming to the aid of the ultra-vulnerable- who are least able to protect themselves. This is a matter of basic human solidarity. It is also crucial for combating the virus. This is the moment to step up for the vulnerable.'

- 1. To undertake a rapid assessment of the socio-economic impact of the pandemic at the household level for persons affected by leprosy residing in leprosy colonies
- 2. To evaluate the abilities of households to cope with the situation
- 3. To provide appropriate recommendations and undertake timely action through the change in programs and advocacy for timely resource mobilization to mitigate the effects

Intervention Logic

- Logical selection of the geographical location: it is based on a large number of Covid-19 infections in six migrant states, demonstrating the fastest doubling rate compared to other Indian states. We selected four based on our existing presence in the states.
- Logical selection of the target groups: PWDs are bearing the double whammy of Covid-19 and being dependent on others for their survival; their family members may or may not have a migrant but are stretched on resources compared to others due to one /more members with special needs; other migrant families have lost their means of livelihood have been put in greater difficulties compared to non-migrant families in the district, with the migrant male member having now returned to the city the female spouse and children are more prone to social exploitation by their extended family members and neighbors.
- Logical selection of key intervention components mental health, livelihood, and educations: in consultation with NLRIF field emergency team and stakeholders.
- Logical selection of partners: NLRIF has experience of working with communities, empowering community structures addressing PWDs and migrants, and established relationship with government departments primarily health and social welfare; APAL has experience of networking and empowering marginalized communities like the Leprosy and PWDs; DISCC has expertise on the mental health of vulnerable populations particularly of children; write about other partners later
- Logical selection of intervention channel, the local CSOs: they know their communities best, their needs and resources; the empowered CSOs will bring a sustainable change.
- Logical selection of activities: with an appropriate mix of tools and technology.

Mr. V. Narsappa, President, APAL presided the meeting. He welcomed all the members and explained the situation during the Covid-19 pandemic in different states.

Mr. Uday Thakar briefly explained the modifications made in the budget for the year 2020-2021, to accommodate the pilot project on awareness of COVID-19. With this modification 12, 000, 00/- are made available for this pilot project which was approved by SHF.

- 2. A maximum of 5 colonies from each state has to be selected. (As far as possible the maximum population should not exceed 250 per colony)

Online Meeting on Media Campaign on Leprosy in India

Concept Note on Media Campaign on Leprosy in India

1. Background

Sasakawa Health Foundation (SHF), National Leprosy Eradication Programme (NLEP) of the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare of India, and WHO India have jointly produced a pictorial flipchart on leprosy for ASHAs to promote early detection and early treatment. It is being delivered to ASHAs in 6 leprosy-endemic states: Gujarat and Chhattisgarh by September 2020, Bihar and Odisha by March 2021, and West Bengal and Jharkhand by March 2022. Furthermore, WHO India is developing a short online movie for ASHAs to teach them how to use the flipchart effectively. SHF would like to launch a media campaign in conjunction with India's Anti-Leprosy Day on January 30, 2021, to boost momentum for the elimination of leprosy as a public health problem at the subnational level.

2. Plan

The media campaign will operate at two levels. There will be a nationwide campaign disseminating the messages that: India has the largest number of leprosy patients in the world, there are still many cases of leprosy-related discrimination that affect marriage and employment prospects, and leprosy must not be forgotten amid the coronavirus pandemic. The nationwide campaign will make use of newspapers, magazines, online media, and SNS messaging, and start at the end of January.

There will also be a campaign at the state level targeting Chhattisgarh, where numbers of new cases and rates of G2D are very high. It will focus on specific issues in the state such as high prevalence, late detection and treatment, and the high G2D rate, and will aim to raise awareness among ASHAs and help them build capacity to detect new patients. The campaign will involve prominent citizens and feature interviews with Mr. Sasakawa, webinars, training

workshops for ASHAs, and distribution of pamphlets. Ideally, it will be conducted in partnership with the Ministry of Health in the state.

3. Roles and Responsibilities

- S-ILF shall carry out the above media campaign.
- APAL shall provide necessary guidance and advice to S-ILF.
- WHO India shall share all information with NLEP and assist in communication between S-ILF and the state governments. Also, it shall provide S-ILF with technical guidance.
- SHF shall cover the costs of the campaign in consultation with S-ILF, monitor progress, and provide advice as appropriate.

- 3. Weekly once the Government officer will visit the colony and check the health issues



It was suggested by members that this issue must be discussed with all state leaders during the regional physical meeting of the state leaders.
- C. FCRA Mr. Uday Thakar informed the changes made by the Home Department in FCRA rules. They have put a limit of 20% on Administration expenses also. The separate bank account should be opened in the State Bank of India, New Delhi, branch & all foreign donations will be received first in the SBI, New Delhi branch account. The government can initiate summary enquiry at any time without prior intimation, as well as the renewal of FCRA certificate will become mandatory withholding IB enquiry of each functionary of the organization. As per the requirement of amended rules of FCRA, the bank account of APAL should be opened in New Delhi.

The meeting was conducted as per the attached program copy (Annexture1) under the Chairmanship of Mrs. Maya Ranavare, Treasurer, APAL.

Mrs. Maya Ranavare welcomed all the members and explained the day's program. Mr. Uday Thakar, Advisor, APAL, briefly explained the object of the meeting and requested the state leadership team and youth to share their activities in detail and participate actively in the discussion.

<u>Maharashtra State Activities presented by Mr. Rasul Mulla, Mr. Bhupal Firgane, and Mrs. Maya</u> Ranavare.

Maharashtra State Leader team shared the difficulties faced, during the Covid-19 pandemic & lockdown. Physical meetings were not possible in this period, but they established good communication through zoom meetings and phone calls. This helped to maintain the morale of the colony leaders & affected persons. During the pandemic Food distribution, Nutritional support, Government Ration schemes were implemented in all colonies with the help of local NGOs and Government authority.

In the initial period, medical services were not available to leprosy-affected persons, as all the staff was deputed for Covid-19 pandemic control. But with the help of local administration & medical service providers, the medical support service like a supply of dressing kit, medicines & other services were restored.

After relaxation in Lockdown, the state team started their work and organized the following activities up to January 2021.

- Maharashtra State Activity-
- 1. The team visited Miraj, Amaravati, Kolhapur, Nashik & Ratnagiri colonies for follow-up work & had a meeting with District Magistrate & Municipal Commissioners.
- 2. In Ratnagiri kitchen utensils and gas distribution under the 'Ujwala' Government scheme was organized. 35 families received the benefit.
- 3. Ration & Food was provided regularly to laborers, who were stuck-up and could not go to their original place. This was done with the support from Government & Municipal Corporations.
- 4. Meeting with Mayor of Solapur & Pune to discuss the enhancement of maintenance allowance provided by Municipal corporations.
- 5. Due to the flood, 18 families from Pandharpur colony, District Solapur, were badly affected. Leprosy-affected persons, Maharashtra Kushtapidit Sanghatana & APAL collectively raised the funds of 45,000/- & distributed them to 18 families of Pandharpur colony. This is a very unique example, where leprosy-affected persons took initiatives & contributed from their sources & helped colony people.
- 6. In Kolhapur, 21 affected persons had a problem with biometric thumb impression & could not get ration under the Government scheme. This issue was discussed in the district Planning Committee Meeting. Collector has passed an order to supply ration to these affected persons regularly.
- 7. In collaboration with SILF & Bajaj Foundation rehabilitation program was initiated in 9 colonies. In the first stage, 108 people were selected. Financial assistance up to rs.40, 000/- was provided to selected persons to start their small livelihood project.

- 8. SILF & Bajaj Foundation were running a joint project to rehabilitate leprosy-affected persons in the colonies. The regional office of the project was inaugurated online at Nashik in December 2020
- 9. 10 bedded referral hospital was constructed in Kalyan Leprosy Colony, which was inaugurated by Dr. Suryavanshi, Commissioner, Kalyan- Dombiwali Municipal Corporation.
- Maharashtra State Leader Team has now started working on the following issues.
- 1. To regularize the unauthorized slums in the Pushpavihar Colony, Borivali, Mumbai.
- 2. To get an allotment of newly constructed houses in the colony of Pandharpur.
- 3. In Mumbai affected persons were getting the support of Rs.800/- under "Sanjay Gandhi Niradhar Yojana" instead of 1000/- declared & approved by the Government. A meeting with the divisional commissioner to discuss this issue was organized.
- Covid-19 Activity presented by Covid Warriors Ms. Sapna, Ms. Snehal and Mr. Adhik.

Covid-19 warriors from Miraj, Sangali, Nashik were present in the meeting and shared their activities & experiences while organizing the Covid-19 project of APAL in the colonies. They reported the following points.

- 1. They have conducted screening camps in the colonies, as per the guidelines, regularly.
- 2. Awareness meetings on Covid-19 were organized in the colonies with support from the local medical team of the corporation. They explained, sign & symptoms of Covid-19, the importance of face mask, washing hands regularly and safe distancing. Covid-19 warriors also highlighted the importance of environment conservation and cleanliness in & around the colony.
- 3. Distributed face mask to colony inmates.
- 4. Local NGOs supported the screening camp activity in the colonies.
- 5. In the Miraj colony, 60 Covid-19 patients were detected. They were sent to Government Civil Hospital. With proper treatment & care, all were discharged from the hospital and came back safely to the colony. These 60 patients were supported with the nutritional diet for 45 days by the local NGO "Sadguru Seva Sanstha".
- 6. In Nashik, local corporator, coordinated with Municipal Health services, and screening activity was conducted twice a month.
- 7. All the colonies are now getting dressing material to treat chronic ulcer patients.
- 8. All colony leaders, people & the Government system wholeheartedly supported these activities & it has helped the Covid-19 warriors to reach out to colony members as well as the other population in & around the colony.

• FCRA Amendment

Mr. Uday Thakar presented the amendments made in the FCRA Act for the understanding of the state leader team & Covid warriors.

The key amendments to the 2010 Act are as follows

- a. Prohibition to accept foreign contribution
- b. <u>Transfer of foreign contribution is disallowed.</u>
- c. Reduction on use of foreign contribution for administrative purpose limit 20%
- d. Adhaar for registration is mandatory
- e. Designated FCRA account in State Bank of India, New Delhi
- f. Restriction in the utilization of foreign contribution
- g. <u>Suspension of registration</u>
- h. Renewal of registration
- i. Surrender of certificate

j. <u>Foreign Contribution received exciding 1,00,000 per annum should be informed to FCRA Division by individuals.</u>

As a foreign contribution to Indian non-profits, how will this Act impact my contributions?

- a. Foreign contributors (FCs) will have to ensure, either by diligence or by obtaining adequate warranties from the recipient entities that such non-profit partners do not have any 'public servant' on their governing board, which would make them ineligible to receive foreign contribution.
- b. FCs will have to ensure their funds are not further distributed by the recipient entity by incorporating necessary restrictions in the terms of the grant.
- c. FCs will have to ensure that the 20% cap on administrative expenses is marked in the budget/purpose of utilization shared by the recipients.
- d. FCs will need to be cognizant of the validity of the FCRA certificate of their recipient organizations.
- e. FCs, in case of a collaboration, will need to enter into separate grant agreements with each of their non-profits partners rather than through one anchor FCRA registered non-profit which would further sub-grant it to other non-profits.

Mr. Uday Thakar explained briefly the provisions of the RPWD Act with power point presentation. He focused on the following points.

- Definition
- Rights
- Duties
- Disability Commissioner-Central / State
- Central / State Committee
- District Committee
- Designated Districts Courts
- Reservation in-employment, Land, Allotment, Housing
- ◆ Central / State Grant Fund
- ◆ Special / Separate employment exchange
 - Compliant –redressal cell

In conclusion, he said that" the Government has amended this Act to suit the UN CRPD provisions. The effective implementation of this Act is necessary to get positive results. So we must make aware disable persons about these provisions & support Government in its effective implementation. He added that now leprosy is included in the total disability Act. We have to work along with all other disabled organizations to get the benefits of this Act.

During the question-answer session, a question was raised. Are children of leprosy-affected persons covered under this Act? Mr.Uday Thakar replied that no such special provision is available for the children of affected persons. This Act will support only disable persons of all categories where children or spouse (normal)0 are not included.

In the end, Mr. Rasul Mulla proposed the vote of thanks & the meeting was concluded.

The Participant State Leaders of Andhra Pradesh explained in detail the problems faced by the people of all colonies during the Covid-19 pandemic and how they tried to manage to arrange food grains. During a pandemic, they stayed at home. They approached different donors and NGOs for support. Due to the non-comparison of thumb impression, the people unable to obtain pension and food grains from the government. The leaders approached by

communicating on phone in different districts and succeeded to get special orders for the release of pension and supply of food grains. Also succeeded in the supply of MCR footwear in 15 colonies. During the Covid-19 pandemic, local donors and NGOs helped with daily food after an appeal on TV. The local donors also provided clothes and blankets in some Colonies. Told that they were unable to continue the ongoing programs due to travel restrictions. Some people were affected with Corona and they took care of treatment. Rising Star, SILF, and Brighter Future also helped them with food grains and cash. They faced problems with ulcer dressing materials APAL helped to arrange the materials by telephonic contacting SLO and DLOs. The Covid-19 Awareness Program run by APAL going well and helping to aware people.

The Telangana State Leaders explained the problems the colony people faced during the Covid-19 pandemic. They talked with Health Minister for support. He helped to get the Government's support regularly during the pandemic. They were unable to go out due to restrictions during the pandemic period. 

Dr. Nanri advised consulting with auditors or any lawyer and assured to extend SHF cooperation in all spheres. He expressed his inability to visit India at present but certainly will address both meetings by webinar conference. We assured him that he will be keep informed with further p



- Sec 89; Any contravention of provisions or rule, fine up to ten thousand rupees for the first contravention and any subsequent contravention fine of fifty thousand to five lakh rupees.
- Sec 90; If the offense is committed by a company, every person who at the time the offense was committed, was in charge and shall be proceeded against and punished accordingly:
- Sec 91; Whoever fraudulently avails any benefit for persons with benchmark disabilities shall be punished with imprisonment up to two years or with a fine which up to one lakh rupees or both.
- Sec 92; Whoever intentionally insults or intimidates, humiliates a person with a disability in any
 public place, assaults or uses force, denies food or fluids, sexually exploits, damages aids and
 appliances, and forcefully terminates pregnancy will be liable for fine and five years
 imprisonment.
- Sec 93; Failure to produce any book, account, other documents, statement, information, or any
 order or direction made or given shall be punishable with a fine of Rs 25000 and Rs one thousand
 for each delayed day of contravention.
