On 11th January 2024, APAL President Mrs Maya Ranavare Participated at the International Purple Festival in Goa 2024 celebrating diversity India's first-of-its-kind inclusive festival that celebrates persons with disabilities from 8th to 13th January.

During the meeting, Mrs. Maya brought up a concern regarding the difficulties individuals affected by leprosy face when obtaining disability certificates. Specifically, she highlighted the lack of knowledge among medical professionals about how to issue certificates to those affected by leprosy. The central and state commissioners for persons with disabilities received this issue positively and are currently developing new standard operating procedures. These procedures will aim to provide assistance to individuals affected by leprosy in obtaining disability certificates in the future.



On 14th January 2024, In collaboration with The Society for Rural Development Society (SRD) and APAL state committee in Telangana recently organized a distribution program for essential commodities, bed sheets, and sarees for leprosy-affected families in the Peddambar Pate Shanti Nagar Leprosy Colony.

The SRD staff took the opportunity to educate the community about the effective management of leprosy. They emphasized the significance of adhering to medical advice, consuming nutritious food, and taking medication regularly to achieve complete recovery. Additionally, they emphasized the importance of seeking medical attention promptly if individuals display symptoms such as dry skin or untouchable body spots. The coordinators of this event, Kranti Kishore and Parvathy, were active participants. It is noteworthy that the SRD staff also tried to dispel the notion that leprosy is a curse and clarify that it is a treatable ailment that requires timely medical attention.

The Government administered the camp, and Mrs. Keroline, a board member of APAL, deserves special recognition for her active contribution and monitoring of the event. Her dedication and commitment to the cause are truly admirable.

The Ayushman card is a national health authority-issued card that provides access to a network of public and private hospitals across India. The card can be used to receive cashless treatment and hospitalization at these network hospitals

The Ayushman Bharat Yojana (PMJAY) is the world's largest health assurance scheme. It aims to provide a health cover of Rs. 5 lakhs per family per year for secondary and tertiary care hospitalization to over 12 crores of poor and vulnerable families

During the meeting, it was unanimously decided that a touch and leprosy detection campaign would be conducted throughout the state from January 30 to February 13, 2024. The campaign will involve Sevakas and ASHA workers conducting door-to-door screenings in all Anganwadi centres, along with banners and posters, while health officers and employees will be running programs in schools and colleges.

The scale of the program this year is noteworthy, especially given the allegations made by the APL team last year regarding the provision of food in the name of the LCD campaign. These allegations led to rumours and the Ghodabandha incident in Jamshedpur, which prompted discussions on the responsible parties and how to maintain character in conducting such a campaign. As a result, plans have been made to run the LCD and Sparsh programs on a larger scale this year.

We urge the Government to duly incorporate these representatives into its programs and initiatives. Doing so would enable a more inclusive and robust policymaking process and enhance the overall effectiveness of the Government's initiatives.

Secondly, the memorandum requested that children or disabled leprosy patients be appointed as dressers in every leprosy colony in the state, where there are ulcer patients. These dressers would receive an honorarium of at least Rs 5000 for treating the ulcer patients.

Lastly, APAL requested to be included in the government's survey conducted throughout the state. This would enable the organization to better understand the needs of the people and provide appropriate support.

APAL expresses its gratitude towards the SLO for his positive response and warm hospitality during the visit. It is hoped that he will take prompt action on the issues raised in the memorandum. Mr. Tiwari highlighted that Dhanbad district has 21 leprosy colonies, and caste certificates have not yet been issued to the children of the leprosy colonies, causing significant problems for the children. Moreover, the Dhokra Panchayat exemplifies the misconceptions about leprosy patients in society. Despite providing 1 acre of 35 decimal land to leprosy patients in 2005, the villagers of Dhokra Panchayat have not allowed the leprosy patients to settle to date.

The Appeal, which will be launched at a ceremony at WHO headquarters in Geneva, Switzerland, on January 31, 2024, is being signed by WHO Director-General Dr. Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus and WHO Goodwill Ambassador for Leprosy Elimination Yohei Sasakawa.

The event is being organized by the Sasakawa Leprosy (Hansen's Disease) Initiative as part of its "Don't Forget Leprosy" campaign. Since 1975, the Initiative has worked closely with the WHO toward the common goal of eliminating leprosy.

Global Appeal 2024 calls for a world where no one is left behind because of a treatable disease, aiming to break the chains of discrimination and ensure dignity for all. Mrs. Maya's delivered message is The eradication of discrimination against individuals affected by leprosy necessitates a collaborative effort.

It is imperative that countries establish laws and policies that acknowledge and address this issue, and involve those affected by leprosy in policy-making to address the problem of discrimination, particularly concerning leprosy.

Countries must also recognize their obligation to prevent third parties from discriminating against persons affected by leprosy, as mandated by international and domestic law. It is also essential that the fourth pillar of non-discrimination in the Global Strategy is not left behind and that all human rights are recognized as universal, interrelated, interdependent, and indivisible.

Individuals affected by leprosy should be recognized as experts with ample experience and be placed at the forefront of strategies aimed at interrupting leprosy transmission. Moreover, the World Health Organization must accord equal significance to all aspects of the Global Strategy.
