

On August 25, 2023, the Forest Department announced that they could not continue the lease on forest area no. 124/1. This decision has caused considerable distress among the residents, many of whom are leprosy patients with limited means. The memorandum highlighted the immediate need to renew the lease to prevent further inconveniences and ensure the well-being of these vulnerable individuals.

Maya Ranavare emphasized the gravity of the situation, underscoring that the forest land serves as the primary habitat for the residents of the Sainath Leprosy Center. The residents depend on this land for their shelter and basic needs, making its renewal critical for their survival. The memorandum was a heartfelt plea for urgent intervention by the Forest Officer to alleviate the suffering of the affected individuals and to provide them with the necessary habitat.

The meeting and the submission of the memorandum showcased the commitment of APAL and the Maharashtra Kusht Pidit Sanghatana to the welfare and rights of leprosy-affected individuals. 


State Committee of APAL in Bihar held a significant meeting with Shriman Ganga Prasad ji, the former Governor of Meghalaya, at his residence in Patna

The main agenda was to advocate for the expansion of the Bihar Satabadi Kushtha Kalyan Yojana, a welfare program designed to enhance the lives of individuals affected by leprosy.

Understanding the significance of this matter, Shri Ganga Prasad ji facilitated the request and assured the committee that the Governor of Bihar would meet with them within the next 1-2 days. This meeting marks a crucial milestone in the ongoing endeavours to secure more comprehensive support and resources for the leprosy-affected community in Bihar.

APAL's President, Maya Ranavare, recently met with the District Leprosy Officer of Sangli to address a pressing issue faced by persons affected by leprosy in the region. The discussion centered on the challenges these individuals encounter when attempting to obtain disability certificates from the government. Despite their eligibility, many struggle with bureaucratic hurdles and delays, making it difficult for them to access the benefits and support they are entitled to Maya Ranavare emphasized the need for a streamlined, efficient, and user-friendly process to ensure that all eligible individuals can obtain their certificates without unnecessary complications. She proposed that the government should implement a more systematic approach, possibly involving better coordination between medical professionals, government offices, and community organizations, to ensure that these certificates are issued promptly and fairly.

The District Leprosy Officer acknowledged the concerns and expressed a willingness to work towards simplifying the process, recognizing the importance of empowering persons affected by leprosy through easier access to their rights.

Maya Ranavare also presented the District Leprosy Officer of Sangli with APAL's annual report book for 2023-2024. This report provides a comprehensive overview of APAL's efforts and achievements over the past year, highlighting the organization's dedication to improving the lives of persons affected by leprosy. By sharing this report, Maya aimed to further inform and engage the District Leprosy Officer in APAL's ongoing initiatives, fostering greater collaboration in addressing the challenges faced by the leprosy-affected community.

During the distribution, Mr. Ramesh emphasized the severe lack of infrastructure development within the colony. He expressed concern over inadequate facilities, including the absence of proper drainage systems, reliable water supply, water taps, CC roads, and

proper waste management systems. The colony's residents are also facing significant challenges due to the poor condition of their houses and bathrooms.

On behalf of the people affected by leprosy residing in the colony, Mr. Ramesh urged government officials and public representatives to provide these basic facilities immediately. He emphasized the need for improved infrastructure to ensure that the leprosy-affected individuals, who are already living in poverty, are not further marginalized. The call to action is a plea for the dignity and well-being of the residents, who deserve a better standard of living and the basic amenities that many take for granted.

APAL expressed gratitude to Mr. Bommishetty Shyambabu for his invaluable kind support to the neediest people affected by the disease of leprosy and their families. Special thanks were also extended to Mr. Ramesh for his dedicated services to leprosy communities.

On August 25, 2024, the President of APAL, Maya Ranavare, alongside the management of APAL's State Committee, held a meeting with the Governor of Odisha, Mr. Raghubar Das, at his office. During the meeting, a memorandum was presented to address a critical issue pertaining to the state's disability pension policy.

Currently, the disability pension of 3,500 rupees is exclusively provided to individuals affected by leprosy who are over 80 years old. This policy has led to the exclusion of many individuals residing in leprosy colonies, enduring significant disabilities and challenging living conditions, who do not meet the age criteria for financial assistance. These individuals, in urgent need of support, are currently deprived of essential resources for sustainable living.

APAL respectfully appealed to the Governor to consider extending the disability pension to all individuals affected by leprosy, regardless of age, by recognizing a 40% disability certificate as the eligibility criterion. This adjustment aims to address the significant gap in

the current policy and ensure that pension benefits reach those most in need, thereby providing these individuals with the means to live with dignity and security. Furthermore, the delegation raised awareness of critical land issues faced by many in the leprosy-affected community, residing in unsafe and uninhabitable housing. They urged the Governor's intervention to address these urgent housing and land concerns, guaranteeing safe and stable living conditions for the vulnerable individuals.

The meeting was attended by Maya Ranavare (President of APAL), Jawahar Ram Paswan (Vice President of APAL), Prabhakar Sahoo (Executive Member of APAL), Biswanadh Sahoo (APAL's State Coordinator in Odisha), and other key members. APAL expressed profound gratitude to the Governor for his positive response and the warm hospitality extended during their visit. APAL remains optimistic that these critical issues will be addressed to enhance the lives of those affected by leprosy in Odisha.

During the session, the organizers initiated a discussion on the necessity of an amended petition to address critical issues faced by people affected by leprosy. They proposed several key demands for inclusion in the new petition:

- 1. National Survey: Conduct a fresh national survey of all individuals affected by leprosy across the country.
- 2. National Policy: Formulate a comprehensive national policy for the empowerment and upliftment of leprosy victims.
- 3. Uniform Subsistence Allowance: Implement a uniform and genuine subsistence allowance across all states.
- 4. Free Medical Facilities: Instruct all states to provide free medical facilities to all leprosy-affected communities.
- 5. Preservation of Rights: Ensure housing and land rights are preserved for leprosy sufferers.
- 6. Free Education and Special Training: Provide free education for the children of leprosy-affected persons and offer special training for competitive government examinations.
- 7. Amendment in Personal Laws: Introduce necessary amendments in personal laws to protect the rights of those affected by leprosy.
- 8. Financial Support for Economic Activities: Provide financial support for small-scale industries and agriculture involving leprosy-affected individuals.
- 9. Tax Exemption for Products: Exempt products made by leprosy-affected persons from VAT/GST.
- 10. Public Awareness Campaign: Address misconceptions and lack of awareness about leprosy through an effective public awareness campaign.





Patna to address critical land-related issues

On the 3rd of September, the State Committee of the Association of People Affected by Leprosy (APAL) in Bihar, referred to as SAMUTHAN, convened at the office of the Land

Reforms Minister in Patna to address critical land-related issues encountered by leprosy colonies in the state. The committee highlighted the significant challenges faced by residents, including insecure land ownership and inadequate living conditions. Emphasizing the urgency of intervention and policy reform, they urged the Land Reforms Minister's office to take concrete steps to address the longstanding land problems affecting the community.

Subsequent to the meeting with the Land Reforms Minister, the committee proceeded to the Social Security Office to submit an application advocating for an elevation in the disability pension for individuals affected by leprosy. They argued that the existing pension amounts are insufficient to meet the basic needs of those living with disabilities and stressed the need for an increase to ensure a more sustainable livelihood. They emphasized that augmenting the pension would significantly enhance the quality of life for individuals affected by leprosy, many of whom already face marginalization and endure social and economic hardships. The delegation expressed optimism that their efforts would yield positive changes and committed to further advocacy for the rights and welfare of leprosy-affected communities in Bihar.

APAL extends its gratitude to the APAL State Committee in Bihar for their advocacy and extends special thanks to Mr. Someswar Dubey, Mr. Kamlesh Chandra Lal, and Mr. Ramvarai Sah for their contributions to the leprosy community.





State Committee of APAL in Jharkhand, accompanied by Mr. Madhusudan Tiwari, conducted a visit to the Angarpathra Leprosy Colony

On the 5th of September 2024, the State Committee of APAL in Jharkhand, accompanied by Mr. Madhusudan Tiwari, conducted a visit to the Angarpathra Leprosy Colony and Tetulmari Leprosy Colony in Dhanbad. Mr. Tiwari actively engaged with the residents of Angarpathra Colony, holding discussions with them to comprehensively understand the myriad challenges and issues they encounter in their daily lives. This visit served as a platform for the residents to articulate their concerns, predominantly centering around the socio-economic adversities and insufficiencies in the support structures within the colony. The significance of Mr. Tiwari's visit lies in its demonstration of APAL's continuing dedication to comprehending and redressing the specific requirements of leprosy-affected communities across Jharkhand.

Additionally, Mr. Tiwari made his inaugural visit to Tetulmari Leprosy Colony, where he uncovered several pressing issues encountered by the residents. In 2004-2005, 20 leprosy patients from Barambe Ranchi were relocated to Tetulmari. Subsequently, in 2008-2009, 22 houses were erected under the Indira Awas Yojana in Block - Baghmara, Tetulmari, Dhanbad, and these were assigned to all the relocated patients, including two local leprosy patients. However, the current circumstances in Tetulmari Leprosy Colony are dire. The residents rely entirely on a modest government pension of ₹1000 and a monthly ration of 5 kg in addition to a PH (Public Health) card. There are no other means of livelihood or supplementary support, leaving the community to subsist solely on these limited provisions. The visit underscored the urgent requirement for augmented support and enhanced living conditions for the residents of Tetulmari, who persist in enduring severe hardships with nominal resources.





APAL State Committee in Andhra Pradesh conducted a health screening camp in collaboration with Kaligiri Leprosy Hospital at the New Jyothi Leprosy Colony in Nellore

In the previous month, the APAL State Committee in Andhra Pradesh conducted a health screening camp in collaboration with Kaligiri Leprosy Hospital at the New Jyothi Leprosy Colony in Nellore. During the visit, they discovered significant obstacles faced by individuals affected by leprosy, particularly in terms of accessing treatment and eye protection services. Many residents were grappling with insufficient healthcare support, elevating the risk of further health complications, including common eye-related issues among those affected by leprosy.

Recognizing the immediacy of the situation, the APAL State Committee promptly engaged with the pertinent Medical Department of the Government and the District Leprosy Officer of Nellore. They submitted a memorandum urging improved healthcare services for the

colony's residents. The Medical Department responded affirmatively, swiftly coordinating healthcare and eye care services tailored to the needs of those affected by leprosy. Furthermore, they administered BCG vaccinations to the residents, addressing a critical health requirement within the community.

The APAL State Committee, in conjunction with the residents of New Jyothi Leprosy Colony, conveyed their deep appreciation to the Medical Department of Nellore for their speedy and compassionate response. They also extended special thanks to the APAL State Committee Mr. Sayilu, Mr. Prakash and Ms. Jyothi an AASHA worker, who played a pivotal role in the initiative in the locality, making significant contributions to the success of the health camp and ongoing support for the community.

State Committee of APAL in Odisha conducted a significant visit to all leprosy colonies in the Balangir district

On the 11th of September 2024, the State Committee of APAL in Odisha conducted a significant visit to all leprosy colonies in the Balangir district. The team, led by Mr. Prabhakar Sahoo, Executive Member of APAL, India, Mrs. Jayanti Pradhan, Secretary of APAL's State Committee Odisha, Mrs. Banita, and Mr. Lokanath Lenka, Member of the State Committee Odisha, engaged with individuals affected by leprosy to discuss the various challenges and issues they encounter in their daily lives. The visit aimed to address the residents' needs, understand their living conditions, and advocate for their rights and welfare.

At Sudpada Adarsh Leprosy Colony, residents emphasized pressing issues such as the proliferation of mosquitoes due to stagnant rainwater, which could not be drained because of inadequate drainage facilities. Furthermore, they raised concerns about the lack of proper land titles (land patta), leaving many families without legal ownership of the land they inhabit, exacerbating their sense of insecurity and instability.

In Narayan Colony, Balangir, the team encountered numerous issues. The residents urgently require land pattas, as well as the construction of a new community hall and pucca houses under the Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana. The community also expressed the need for better sanitation facilities, including the construction of a community toilet. Additionally, they reported that children from the colony are not receiving scholarships under the Sahaya Schemes or the Umbrella Schemes provided by the Odisha Government, limiting their educational opportunities and support.

At Gaintala Colony in Girigobardhanpur, Balangir, which houses 85 individuals across 35 families, 25 out of 33 eligible families have already received land pattas; however, some families are still without legal titles. The president of the colony, Mr. Bighnaraj Rout, along with other residents, voiced concerns about the need for further land patta allocation, the construction of pucca houses, and an improved water supply. Additionally, the community lacks adequate Medical Care and Rehabilitation (MCR) footwear, and they face a dire need for dressing and ulcer care kits. Similar to the other colonies, the children in Gaintala Colony are also facing issues with accessing scholarships.

The visit by APAL's Odisha state committee underscored the urgent need for governmental intervention to address the basic living conditions and welfare of people affected by leprosy in Balangir district. The delegation promised to follow up on these

issues and advocate for solutions that would help improve the lives of these marginalized communities.

By sharing these examples, the delegation underscored the urgent need for Bihar to increase its welfare allowance to ensure that those affected by leprosy in the state receive the support they deserve. To formalize this request, the APAL committee members submitted a memorandum, urging the state to enhance the existing pension scheme for leprosy patients, aligning it with the standards of other states across India.

On 22nd September 2024, Maya Ranavare, the President of APAL, and representatives from the Maharashtra Kusht Sanghatana, recently held a meeting with Honorable MLA Annasaheb Bansode, Pimpri Vidhan Sabha, to address the pressing issue of rehabilitating leprosy patients residing in the impoverished urban leprosy colony situated in Niradhar Nagar, Pimpri, Pune-411018. This colony has been home to leprosy patients who have been marginalized by society and their families for over 50 years. Despite the provision of basic amenities such as electricity, water, and roads by the Pimpri Chinchwad Municipal Corporation (PCMC), the residents continue to grapple with significant challenges due to their economic vulnerability and social exclusion.

During the meeting, the delegation, led by Maya Ranavare, emphasized the plight of the 33 families living in the colony. Each household has been issued photo passes by the PCMC, and house leases have been applied to their homes, providing a certain degree of security. However, these families, predominantly reliant on daily wage labour, continue to face hardships stemming from financial instability and inadequate housing. Ranavare and the Maharashtra Kusht Sanghatana sought MLA Annasaheb Bansode's assistance in ensuring the residents are relocated to a more dignified and suitable location.

The delegation also informed the MLA that they had previously submitted a letter to the PCMC Commissioner on March 17, 2023, urging action on the rehabilitation matter. The Commissioner had referred the issue to the Town Planning Department, but unfortunately, no report has been received so far. The meeting with MLA Bansode aimed to secure his support in expediting the process and ensuring that the concerns of the leprosy patients are promptly addressed, allowing them to live with dignity in Pimpri.

On the 28th of September 2024, Mr. Prakash, Treasurer of the Association of People Affected by Leprosy (APAL), in conjunction with leaders from various leprosy colonies in Bhimavaram, undertook an initiative to address the inadequate infrastructure in their communities. They presented a memorandum to the government authorities outlining the critical issues affecting their living conditions. The memorandum underscored the urgent requirement for enhanced drainage systems, consistent power supply, access to clean water, sanitation, and proper CC roads within the colonies. Recognizing the gravity of these issues, Mr. Prakash and the colony leaders advocated for immediate government intervention to improve the lives of people affected by leprosy in the area.

The authorities, including Mr. K. Ramachandra Reddy, Municipal Commissioner of Bhimavaram Municipality, sanitation officers, deputy engineer, electrical engineer, and water section officer, responded affirmatively and promptly by visiting the colonies (New Jyothi and Krupa Colonies) and surrounding areas to firsthand assess the situation. During their visit, they observed unhygienic drainage systems, irregular power and water supply, and the poor condition of the roads. The officials also engaged with the colony residents, discussing the daily challenges they faced and potential improvement solutions. Following a comprehensive assessment, the authorities assured the residents that improved living spaces and surroundings would be provided as soon as possible, instilling hope for a better quality of life among the colony's inhabitants.

APAL expressed their sincere gratitude to the authorities for their immediate response and commitment to enhancing conditions in Bhimavaram's leprosy colonies. On 1st October, a detailed inspection was carried out by the authorities of the Municipal Corporation of Bhimavaram, Andhra Pradesh, revealing critical issues in local infrastructure that were directly affecting the residents' quality of life. The inspection focused on several major areas, including drainage, electricity, and road conditions, all of which were found to be in need of urgent attention.

Key Findings and Challenges

- 1. **Drainage Obstruction**: The drainage systems were significantly obstructed by overgrown vegetation and accumulated debris. This blockage resulted in unsanitary conditions, posing health risks for the residents. The poor drainage infrastructure had led to stagnant water, which can be a breeding ground for various diseases and exacerbate sanitation challenges in the community.
- 2. **Unreliable Electricity Supply**: The electricity supply in the area was found to be inconsistent, further complicating the daily lives of the residents. This unreliability in electricity service impacted not only residential comfort but also limited the functionality of other critical services that rely on stable power.
- 3. **Access to Clean Water**: Access to clean and potable water was sporadic, adding to the daily hardships faced by the community. Inadequate water supply is a major concern in any community, as it affects health, sanitation, and overall quality of life.
- 4. **Damaged Roads**: The roads within the locality were in a state of disrepair, making transportation difficult and posing safety hazards, especially during the rainy season when potholes and uneven surfaces become even more problematic.

Community Engagement and Immediate Response

During the inspection, municipal officials engaged directly with the colony's residents, enabling them to understand the specific challenges the community was facing. This direct interaction was instrumental in identifying actionable steps to address these pressing issues, which had long been overlooked. The government representatives committed to prioritizing these issues and addressing them promptly, which instilled a renewed sense of hope and reassurance among the residents.

Government Actions and Intervention

Following the inspection, the government took decisive actions to address the identified infrastructure issues. Some of the key steps included:

- Clearing Vegetation and Debris from Drainage Systems: Efforts were promptly initiated to clear the overgrown vegetation and debris from the drainage systems, improving sanitation and reducing health risks associated with stagnant water.
- **Planning for Essential Service Enhancements**: Plans were laid out for further improvements in essential services, which included stable electricity supply, consistent access to clean water, and the repair of damaged roads. These plans aim to bring long-term relief to the community.

Report on Cleanliness Intervention Led by Mr. Someshwar Dubey at Gandhi Gram Ashram, Mothipur on 1st October 2024.

Introduction Mr. Someshwar Dubey, the State Coordinator of the Association of People Affected by Leprosy (APAL), has taken a significant step in advancing the well-being of the residents of Gandhi Gram Ashram in Mothipur. Recognizing the vital role of a clean and hygienic environment for the health and morale of the community, Mr. Dubey spearheaded a cleanliness intervention aimed at revitalizing the neglected areas of the Ashram. Through this application, APAL seeks to ensure that these families, many of whom have faced social stigma and economic

challenges due to their conditions, can access secure and dignified living conditions, a fundamental need and a long-overdue right.

The application underscores the urgent need for permanent housing for these communities, which have often been marginalized and lack adequate access to basic amenities. By facilitating this process, Mr. Tiwari and APAL aim to uplift the affected families, offering them a stable foundation that fosters self-reliance and a sense of belonging within society. It is anticipated that the Deputy Commissioner will respond positively, recognizing the importance of inclusive development. If successful, this endeavour will not only enhance the living standards of these families but also reaffirm their rightful place in society, reinforcing the government's commitment to social equity

and housing for all.

On 7th October 2024, In Gandhi Gram Post Ashram, Motipur, there is a group of 40 leprosy patients, all of whom are ration cardholders and depend on assistance to obtain essential rations. These individuals, due to their particular circumstances, receive their ration supplies based on verification of identification by Vikas Mitra, a community-level facilitator appointed to assist marginalized groups. Unlike the standard procedure for ration distribution, these ration cardholders are exempt from the usual KYC (Know Your Customer) process, as their identification and entitlement verification rely solely on Vikas Mitra's confirmation. While effective for these patients, this setup deviates from the broader ration distribution system.

To formalize this arrangement and ensure its continuity, all the cardholders recently submitted a memorandum through the M.O. and B.D.O. (Block Development Officer) of Motipur. The initiative was spearheaded by Someshwar Dubey, APAL's State Coordinator in Bihar, who advocated for the interests of the leprosy-affected group. This memorandum seeks official recognition of the current distribution method, enabling them to continue accessing rations without the need for KYC. In response, local authorities have pledged to forward the memorandum to the district administration. Any requisite directives will be

issued at the district level to institutionalize this arrangement, thereby ensuring uninterrupted access to essential rations for these patients.

They were joined by the dedicated representatives of the Maharashtra Kusht Pidit Sanghatana to address a pressing issue impacting the leprosy-affected community residing in this area. The primary objective of their visit was to support and advocate for the rights of these vulnerable families, who currently face the potential threat of eviction as a result of a recent notice issued by the Forest Department.

For the past 35 years, the leprosy patients residing in Kudus Dashaashram have established their lives on Mangalgad Hill. Presently, approximately 50 families, predominantly from economically disadvantaged backgrounds, call this location home. Despite living in modest dwellings with limited resources, these families have exhibited remarkable resilience, dedicating themselves to achieving stability and securing education for their children. The community encompasses individuals of varying ages, from young

children to elderly residents, all of whom have managed to sustain their livelihoods through determination and arduous effort.

In 1991, the government officially allotted this land to the Leprosy Department, acknowledging the necessity for a secure environment for those affected by leprosy. However, the recent eviction notice issued by the Forest Department has cast uncertainty over the future of these families. The visit by Maya Ranavare and the APAL State Committee, alongside representatives from the Maharashtra Kusht Pidit Sanghatana, constituted a significant initiative aimed at advocating for the retraction of this notice and seeking a permanent resolution for the residents of Kudus Dashaashram.

They have appealed to the authorities to reconsider the eviction notice and to recognize the longstanding connection these families maintain with their home on Mangalgad Hill. By withdrawing the notice and facilitating a sustainable resolution, the government can ensure that these families retain their dignity and security. The collaborative efforts of APAL and the Maharashtra Kusht Pidit Sanghatana underscore the imperative of safeguarding the rights of marginalized communities and promoting an inclusive society.

On 21st February 2025, APAL's State Committee in Maharashtra, in collaboration with Maharashtra Kusht Pidit Sanghatana, took a significant step in advocating for the land rights of the residents of the Indiranagar Leprosy Colony in Miraj. On 20th February 2024, members of both organizations and residents of the colony staged a protest in front of the Sangli, Miraj, and Kupwad Municipal Corporation offices, demanding immediate action for the rehabilitation of leprosy-affected families who had been displaced due to the ongoing

demolition of their homes. The protest aimed to bring attention to the long-standing issue of land rights and the urgent need for permanent housing for the affected families, who have been struggling without a place to stay.

During the protest, Mr. Jitendra Chavan State coordinator in Maharashtra presented a formal letter outlining the key demands of the displaced residents. The protestors emphasized that the 28 affected families had been living in Indiranagar for years, and despite multiple appeals, their rehabilitation had not been prioritized. They insisted on an expedited process to provide them with alternative housing under government schemes. The demonstration attracted widespread attention, drawing support from various community members and human rights activists advocating for the dignity and well-being of leprosy-affected individuals.

In response to the protest, the Sangli, Miraj, and Kupwad Municipal Corporation administrations acknowledged the demands and assured the protestors of a positive approach to resolving the issue. Officials confirmed that under the Swachh Miraj Station Road Scheme and the Babasaheb Ambedkar Housing Scheme, the displaced families had already been relocated. They committed to demolishing the remaining western part of the affected area and ensuring the rehabilitation of all affected residents within the next two to three months. The administration urged the protestors to call off the demonstration, assuring them that the process was already in motion and that the authorities were committed to securing permanent housing for the leprosy-affected families. While the intervention and protest marked a crucial step in amplifying the voices of Indiranagar's leprosy-affected community, APAL's State Committee in Maharashtra and Maharashtra Kusht Pidit Sanghatana pledged to closely monitor the implementation of the promised rehabilitation. They vowed to continue their advocacy until all displaced families receive their rightful homes and are fully integrated into mainstream society with dignity and security.

Additionally, a visit to the Dhanbad Municipal Corporation was conducted to assess applications under the Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana.

The Food Corporation of India (FCI) issued an eviction notice to the Domgarh Leprosy Colony, which necessitated an appeal for intervention. Similarly, the Railway Department notified the BMP Leprosy Colony, prompting discussions with administrative officials regarding potential rehabilitation solutions. A meeting was convened with the Additional District Magistrate (ADM), during which representatives urged the authorities to acknowledge the residents' rights and to refrain from executing forced evictions in the absence of alternative housing options.

Officials at the Dhanbad Municipal Corporation reviewed the status of housing applications, discussing the requisite measures to secure benefits for the affected families. The efforts were led by APAL representatives, including Vice President Jawahar Ram Paswan and Jharkhand Leader Madhusudan Tiwari.

Authorities have been urged to undertake appropriate actions, and follow-up meetings are planned to ensure rehabilitation support and long-term housing security for displaced residents.

Many individuals affected by leprosy have lost their fingers due to ulcers, making it difficult for them to provide fingerprints, a mandatory requirement for availing government social entitlements, including food security benefits. This long-standing issue has prevented several people from accessing their rightful benefits, leaving them in a vulnerable state. Recognizing this challenge, APAL intervened to ensure that these individuals from Sevada Aashram Machla, Indore, were not deprived of their essential needs due to a technical limitation.

To address this issue, APAL's State Committee in Madhya Pradesh organized a visit to the Collector's Office, taking affected individuals along to advocate for a viable solution. With persistent efforts and dialogue, they successfully convinced the authorities to accept an alternative biometric verification method—iris scanning—for the submission of their Know Your Customer (KYC) details. This breakthrough ensured that individuals who could not provide fingerprints due to their condition were still able to access their ration cards and other social benefits without further obstacles. This initiative not only resolved an immediate issue but also set a precedent for similar cases, strengthening the movement for equal rights and inclusion of persons affected by leprosy in government welfare programs.
